



The INTRODUCTIONS in the New Testament letters are not mere standard GREETINGS; they are carefully chosen words that prepare our HEARTS to receive the inspired words that follow.

The RECIPIENTS of grace and peace were the CHURCHES and CHRISTIANS.
Therefore, these blessings are for God's children and servants of Christ—those loved by God and sanctified.





The SOURCE of these blessings is from our Father, and Lord Jesus. Grace is a BENEFIT for us that flows out of God's goodness, creating an "everything-asit-should-be-peace." Even more so, the old covenant prophesied that a prominent CHARACTERISTIC of the new covenant would be peace with God and one another. So, this is not merely a greeting; it's a summary of our RELATIONSHIP with our God.

Grace and peace overflow into right THINKING and right LIVING. It didn't matter the circumstance, the REASON for every letter was so that the readers experienced the LOVE of God.

Implications from Paul's Introductions

Mentioning these blessings REMINDED the readers of their relationship with God and gave them CONFIDENCE of their salvation.

The instructions within the letters were how the readers MAINTAINED grace and peace and guaranteed spiritual growth.

Implications from Paul's Introductions

When Paul used strong and REPROVING words toward his readers, the introductions could remind them of his desires and INTENTIONS for them: grace and peace.

These blessings were only for the readers who OBEYED what they read.
